



# Notice to Mariners



## **Nutating Gears**


The January 94 issue of Mechanical Engineering had an article about a system of gears, known as nutating gears, which

could be a suitable substitute for many different types of gear systems. Nutating gears may have applications in modeling.

The basic concept is like this. Consider a coin that is spinning on a table. As it begins to slow down the coin wobbles. As it wobbles the coin traces a circle on the table. To understand this consider a point, A, on the edge of the coin. As the coin wobbles A comes in contact with the table at point B. A little while later as A again comes in contact with the table it will be a little farther around the circle at point C. See illustration. Try it with a quarter. As it wobbles you can see the head rotate. For every nutation (wobble) of the coin there is a partial rotation of the coin.



A nutating system is one in which one gear is nutating instead of rotating. See the illustration for a possible nutating gear system. I can make copies of the article for anyone who might be interested in seeing this in more detail.



Channels or Chain-wales - Broad thick planks projecting horizontally from the side of a ship, used to spread the shrouds and thus provide better support for the masts. The upper ends of the chains pass through notches on the outer edge of the channels.


