



Show and Tell

By Force of Arms- Alan Frazer brought along an announcement of this new book written by James Nelson. It features a US Navy officer, Captain Bittlecomb in the period

from 1774. The book is published by Simon and Schuster and it sounded pretty good.

Plate III- Alan also brought along a plate showing the rigging of a ship form the early 1800's. The plate explained such esoteric terms as lardwedges and blubber gudgeons.

Hull Carving Machine- During some research, Alan was asked to identify the device in an older photograph. It turned out the machine was used to carve wooden hulls for the test tanks at the David Taylor Research Center. It seems to be a kind of parallelogram device with a cutting head that is guided by a template. The photo shows a very large hull being carved, perhaps 8' long.

Racing Shells- Graham Horne brought along two model shells he is building, one of which appeared to be finished. right down to scale tennis shoes. (Ed. Note: the shoes seem to have been improperly laced. They should have been left over right not right over left. Or maybe it's the other way around. Had to try and find something wrong with the model.) As usual, Graham's building jigs were as much a work of art as his models.

Eagle- Joe McCleary brought along his model of the Eagle and it seems to be coming along nicely. Joe always makes it a point to demonstrate the 1001 things you can do with the box a model is transported in. The box is always quite a show and demonstrates that some retired submariners have more than water in the ballast tank between their ears.

Joe also discussed his procedure for bending planks. He uses dry heat from a soldering iron with a brass sleeve over the barrel. The back of the plank has to be kept moist to keep it from splintering. **Old Sliver Tongued** McCleary uses saliva to keep the plank wet.

Joe has used Varethane, a water clean-up polyurethane, on the decks inside the model. He scrapes down to the wood to apply glue.

Models- We had a good turnout of models on the display tables. Thanks to everyone who put something out to show.

We adjourned at 2110 after what seemed to be one of the shortest meetings on record. Jim McCurdy was either in a hurry to eat or he didn't like sitting up front by himself.

Thanks to Alan Frazer and David Tagg for providing the refreshments and a big thanks to Emmanuel Episcopal Church for the use of the facilities.

Notice to Mariners

Mariners' Museum Model Contest Results-

As promised 2 issues ago, I am going to go over some of the judges comments on the models that our members had in last years contest and that they brought to the December meeting. My notes were kind of cryptic and its been a while since I looked at them but I will do my best. I expect a number of corrections to next month's newsletter.

Graham Horne-Graham entered his model of a St. Lawrence skiff. Specific comments were that the thole pin lashings did not appear sufficient. Overall it was a nice model but not good enough for a medal.

Bob Comet- Bob entered 3 models in the contest.

Shore Bird- this skipjack model was well received. In particular, the winch and dredger were well done. The judges mentioned seeing some glue puddles and dirty wood and the fact that there were a lot of skipjack models.

Rothskild- this is a relatively simple kit that the judges felt really needed some more work and detailing to surmount the simplicity.

Whale boat- this Model Shipways kit had good fidelity and made an excellent impression. The judges mentioned that the sheer strakes were uneven.

Ulrich Guenther- Ulrich entered a model of a Dutch yacht from 1660. The model was built from a Mamoli kit. The hull was symmetrical and the finish and workmanship were good. The judges would have liked to see some extra research.

Joe McCleary- Joe entered his model of the HMS Epervier. Overall the model made a good impression and the gun tackles, boats, sweeps and oars stood out. They did feel the model was too bland and didn't provide enough contrast.

John Cheevers- John entered his model of the tug Huntington. The judges found the model to be historically interesting and liked the photoetched logo on the side of the stack. They felt the highly detailed deck was not consistent with the rest of the model and they would like to have seen an open and detailed pilothouse.

Jack Bobbitt- Jack entered 2 models in the contest.

Wave- The judges liked the choice of subject for this

model. They liked the workmanship and loved the fittings, particularly the engines. They would like to have seen some hull planking, even just simulated, and they spotted an uneven waterline and a problem in the stern.

Sunny South- This model had high quality metalwork and again the judges loved the engines and the steering gear. The hull planking was well done and overall the workmanship was good. They did feel the sails were too loosely woven and that the rigging was fuzzy.


